SFCP BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS MARCH 27, 2023

Our March Board meeting began with the introduction of Laurie Bankhead, Lyman Hollins and Jonathan Shedler who attended our meeting in consideration of joining our Board. In addition, SFCP members Katherine MacVicar and Georgine Marrott were in attendance.

In my Chair Report, I updated the Board on the recent activities of the Finance Committee in light of the recent regional banking challenges. As we have an account with the First Republic Bank, we readjusted our account total within the FDIC guidelines. The Finance Committee will continue to monitor this situation and make recommendations to the Board as needed.

SFCP Board Meeting Highlights March 27, 2023 cont.

Marcia Hodges, Administrative Director, provided the Board with the timelines for the 2023-24 budget development process. She has been working closely with the Division Chairs, our accounting firm Nonprofit Suites, Nicole Lee and the Finance Committee to build next year's budget. The Finance Committee will be meeting regularly with Marcia to evaluate and establish all of the components of the budget leading up to final Board approval in the June Board meeting.

Michael Harrington, Chair of the Audit Committee, reported the 2021-2022 financial review findings from the accounting firm Crosby and Kaneda to the Board. Quoting Crosby & Kaneda, "based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepts in the United States of America." As Michael commented in our meeting, "from an audit standpoint this amounts to a clean bill of health." Working with Marcia and Nonprofit Suites, Michael interviewed and evaluated several firms to complete our next audit. Mullins PC was chosen for their extensive experience working with like-sized nonprofit organizations in California as well as for the access provided by the senior management.

Katherine MacVicar and Georgine Marrott each spoke to their desire to continue the dialogue on analyst training requirements. The Board reaffirmed the recent vote by the SFCP membership to change the minimum requirements.

The following SFCP members have volunteered to participate in the Candidate Training Grants Task Force: Beth Steinberg, Maria Longuemare, Bill Glover, Cheryl Goodrich, Marcia Hodges, and Paul Sorbo. Our first meeting will be held on May 23, 2023.

- Under the leadership of **Emily Brewer**, the **Referral Service** has resumed offering psychoanalytic consultation and referrals for members of the general public who contact the Referral Service voicemail. The implementation of the online **SFCP Referral List** by the Management Team has been briefly paused while technical issues are sorted out to allow members to securely update referral postings through their existing member portal (expected rollout date this summer).
- All three psychoanalytic psychotherapy training programs (**CAPPTP, PAPPTP, and SF-PPTP**) are currently accepting applications for fall training programs. SFCP President's Report cont.

In very distressing news, our accrediting organization – the **American Psychoanalytic Association (APSA)** – is in the midst of an evolving painful crisis as described in this [APSA Crisis- Abbreviated Summary & Selected Posts as of 4/6/23](#) prepared by the Management Team. Subsequently, former **APSA President Kerry Sulkowicz** posted his [Letter of Resignation](#) and **new APSA President Dan Prezant** posted [Let's Repair this Together](#) on 4/7/23. **Dr. Beverly Stoute** announced her [Resignation from the Executive Committee](#) on 4/10/23, with intention to remain on the Holmes Commission and the APSA Board of Directors. **APSA Program Committee Chair Don Moss** has affirmed that plans are underway to present a program at the **APSA Summer Meetings** (June 9 - June 11 via Zoom), which will include panel reflections on this complex and painful series of events.

Many participants on the APSA listserv have conceptualized this sequence of decisions and reactions as part of a widespread organizational enactment, fueled by multiple layers of personal and systemic trauma, past and present. From this vantage point, the enactment is rooted in both longstanding and more recent interpersonal/organizational conflicts – all of which are contextualized and structured by a range of historical traumas, including antisemitism across millenia; centuries of Islamophobia and anti-Arab racism; anti-BIPOC racist oppression and violence (both overt and covert); the horrors of the Holocaust; the ongoing Israeli/Palestinian tragedies, and deeply-rooted misogyny.

The APSA crisis serves as a living example of the degree to which these destructive forces can threaten our collegial relationships, our training institutions, our personal safety, and our psychoanalytic minds. I agree with many who feel it is imperative that we resist the immediate push to locate the destructiveness within individuals, and that we instead think further about the ways in which we are enacting group processes which are ultimately destructive to ourselves and to the field of psychoanalysis that we value and hold dear.

It is clear that the next steps we take as a psychoanalytic organization (locally and nationally) will have a profound impact on our future. The SFCP Management Team is considering the possibility of a moderated forum to discuss these events directly and will keep members posted as things evolve, hopefully in the direction of much-needed reconciliation, healing, and collective learning.

Receiving CE/CME at SFCP

The SFCP CE/CME Committee is urgently seeking new committee members in order for SFCP to continue to offer continuing education credits for our programs. To meet accreditation rules, the ACCME (which approves CME for physicians) requires that an SFCP analyst member attend the APsA Continuing Education Committee meeting at the Winter Meetings (remote or in-person), and the APA (which approves CE for psychologists, MFTs, LCSWs, etc) requires that a licensed psychologist participate in the CE approval process. Other licensed clinicians are also welcome.

Introductory Thoughts on Leadership and Psychoanalytic Theory and Technique

The SFCP's Strategic Direction Team on Supporting and Developing Leadership is dedicated to implementation of the leadership support initiatives that have come out of SFCP's Strategic Planning Initiative. One of our first steps is to provide leadership support and training to SFCP members who have volunteered for leadership roles. This is the first in a series of short articles on leadership specifically for members assuming a leadership role in a volunteer membership organization like SFCP.

In the world of organizational psychology and business, there are many theories of effective leadership, but they all contain some variation on three main components: vision, task, and relationship. Leaders need vision to help create the overall purpose of their organization, a mission, and strategies that align with that purpose. Tasks are of course the nuts and bolts of getting work done, such as doing research, preparing written materials, and managing budgets. Relationship skills are crucial for motivating and developing others, building trust, influencing, and managing conflict when it arises. No matter what you are doing as a leader, you must attend to all three elements of leadership. All are necessary; none alone is sufficient.

The powerful forms of thinking that psychoanalysis and psychodynamic therapy have developed can be helpful in the realms of vision, task, and relationship. Free association, attention to metaphor and symbolism, and respect for slowly evolving processes can be useful tools in the creative and collaborative aspects of leadership, such as shaping a vision or brainstorming new programs and initiatives.

At the same time, it is important to distinguish what works in the analytic process from what works in an organizational process. Bion famously warned analysts against memory and desire to allow room for what emerges. Institutions need to function more as a container—to borrow another Bionian term—that provides consistency and clarity. When leaders are explicit in their beliefs and expectations, it provides a contained working environment where member volunteers are clear about assigned tasks and common goals. While the analyst attends to whatever arises, the leader attends to what has to be accomplished. Free-floating discussions need to be capped by clear decisions that can lead to clear objectives with specific timelines and responsibilities.

While a psychoanalytic background is of course an asset in the relationship building that is essential to good leadership, there are a few pitfalls to watch out for. Psychoanalytic technique certainly gives us thoughtful approaches to building rapport with others, untangling conflicts and competing desires in groups, and managing projections. But psychoanalytically trained leaders can get caught up in diagnosing the deep roots of a problem that may need to be resolved practically.

In coming newsletters, we will look more closely at the separate skills of vision, task, and relationship and how they present a particular challenge for leaders within a membership organization like SFCP.

Would you like to meet with an analyst to discuss your questions about psychoanalytic thinking and clinical work? We'd love to meet with you! The Mentoring Program at SFCP matches participants with analyst mentors to discuss the mentee's interest in psychoanalytic work.

The Mentoring Program is open to mental health clinicians at all levels of training and experience, who are SFCP Community Members, an easy and fun community to join! Mentors meet once a month with mentees for the academic year.

Examples of Topics to Discuss:

- Information, resources and literature to help a mentee explore particular areas of interest. For example: work with particular populations such as trauma survivors; current thinking about LGBTQ issues; the impact of race, class and culture on psychological life; child work; mindfulness; research about psychoanalytic process; and psychoanalytic interfaces with other fields such as poetry, literature, neurosciences
- How to choose among current activities, programs, courses, and services offered by SFCP that are relevant to the mentee's interests and stage of training
- Questions about developing as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and about psychoanalytic training
- Connecting the mentee with colleagues who the mentor thinks might be a valuable resource based on the mentee's interest in a particular subject

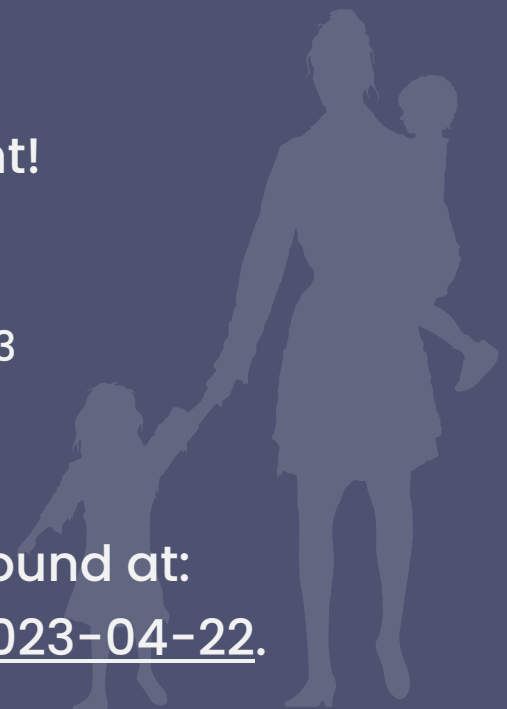
