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### **SFCP Board Chair Report**

In March the SFCP Board of Trustees welcomed a new trustee who will also serve as our treasurer. As the Nominating and Governance Committee of the Board sometimes does, we selected a treasurer from outside SFCP membership who brings specific and necessary expertise. Our new treasurer, Rui Bao, currently works as the Chief Business Official for the Belmont-Redwood Shores School District. Among other areas, she manages the budget and facilities for the district. Rui also serves on the Board for FACES SF, a non-profit that supports families and children. Prior to her career in education, Rui was a management consultant for McKinsey & Company. Along with a lot of enthusiasm and ideas, Rui brings her education from Yale – in Ethics, Politics, and Economics – and her Master's Degree in the Management of School Systems. We are lucky to have her. Welcome, Rui!

We very much appreciate Steve Larson's tenure as treasurer, and particularly thank him for extending his term until we secured a new treasurer. Steve brought his extensive financial expertise to SFCP, and the organization is better for it. Thank you, Steve!

Also at the March Board meeting, Trustees discussed and approved a proposal brought by the SFCP Leadership Team – Maria Longuemare, Marcia Hodges, and I – to authorize members of Strategic Direction Team #2: Promoting an Inclusive & Reflective Organization and the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Steering Committee to draft and propose a process for SFCP to address challenging interactions that occur about race. The purpose is to create a voluntary process that allows for learning and repair. Currently SFCP does not have a way to address these interactions. David Luna, SFCP's DEI consultant, has extensive expertise in this arena and will help the group as they research, design, and draft a proposal. The group will reach out to various SFCP groups, committees, and members throughout the process. The group plans to bring a proposal to the Board in the Fall. Other key points and votes from the March Board meeting:

- The Board approved Beate Klein's analyst membership to SFCP. Welcome, Beate!
- The Finance Committee reported that SFCP remains on budget for this academic year. This will remain true if the Annual Campaign reaches its goal of \$130,000.

<u>Membership Division (Chair Meryl Botkin)</u> - the Membership Division has been coordinating with the Strategic Directions teams to develop processes for inviting new and existing members to engage further with the activities at the Center, to develop a database for open positions, and to formalize succession planning for the leadership roles. We are very appreciative of these efforts to promote the sharing of responsibility amongst our members and to ease the burden on existing leaders by facilitating smooth transition processes.

<u>Psychoanalytic Education Division (PED Division Chair Beth Steinberg)</u> - In addition to celebrating the 2024 graduates, the psychoanalytic training progam has been actively planning for 2024-25 and is expecting a full class of 9 incoming candidates. # An update from the Community Engagement Strategic Directions team: "Promoting an Inclusive, Reflective Organization"

In the Fall of 2022, SFCP engaged in a strategic planning process. Four strategic directions were determined, each with a voluntary committee to move the work forward.

The Strategic Directions "Promoting an Inclusive, Reflective Organization" committee has been slowly taking up the three foci highlighted within our directive in the strategic plan —diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI), group dynamics, and organizational repair processes. Many other committees are also working on these issues generatively, and we hope to have greater integration of these efforts in the future.

Our first initiative was to develop a list of aspirations for interacting with each other within our committee and the wider community. We offer these as an invitation to hold in mind as we engage together in community. We hope these aspirations will facilitate healthier group processes and serve in concert with future organizational commitments to inclusion in SFCP. Our hope is that as a community we will develop a greater ability to think about—and take responsibility for— our organizational culture, unconscious biases, individual and group roles, and impacts upon one another.

#### Aspirations for Community Engagement

- 1. We recognize that we are colleagues with a shared investment in psychoanalysis.
- 2. We are from different identities, training levels, and social positions. We remember to welcome and value diverse voices and perspectives.
- 3. We are curious about what unconscious processes may be influencing our participation and group dynamics.
- 4. We understand that racism and other systems of oppression influence our interactions with each other in content and process. We attempt to recognize, rectify, and repair the damage done.
- 5. We are curious about our resistance. We recognize when we are activated and take a moment to self-reflect.
- 6. We hold room to engage and discuss unpopular ideas and commit to respect for dissenting voices. We turn conflict into shared exploration.
- 7. We recognize that we can do harm without intending to and we are responsible for the impact of our behavior. We recognize harms occur and that we can cause/do harm without intention.
- 8. We recognize our interdependence. We trust that everyone has wisdom and that everyone's wisdom is needed.

Our current committee work is collaborating with Clara Kwun of the DEI Steering Committee and David Luna, SFCP's DEI Consultant, to develop an initial draft of a reconciliation and repair process for racial injury at SFCP. We will keep you posted on our progress and future projects.

### **CE/CME Update**

Would you like to meet with an analyst to discuss your questions about psychoanalytic thinking and clinical work? We'd love to meet with you! The Mentoring Program at SFCP matches participants with analyst mentors to discuss the mentee's interest in psychoanalytic work.

The Mentoring Program is open to mental health clinicians at all levels of training and experience, who are SFCP Community Members, an easy and fun community to join! Mentors meet once a month with mentees for the academic year.

#### Examples of Topics to Discuss:

- Information, resources and literature to help a mentee explore particular areas of interest. For example: work with particular populations such as trauma survivors; current thinking about LGBTQ issues; the impact of race, class and culture on psychological life; child work; mindfulness; research about psychoanalytic process; and psychoanalytic interfaces with other fields such as poetry, literature, neurosciences
- How to choose among current activities, programs, courses, and services offered by SFCP that are relevant to the mentee's interests and stage of training
- Questions about developing as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and about psychoanalytic training
- Connecting the mentee with colleagues who the mentor thinks might be a valuable resource based on the mentee's interest in a particular subject



# Lives Across Time, Part 2:

The Clinical and Attachment Implications of a Psychoanalytic Longitudinal Study of 76 People from Birth

Henry Massie, MD and Nathan Szajnberg, MD will discuss case studies from a prospective psychoanalytic study of paths to emotional health and illness from birth to age 30 and 60. This study, initiated by Sylvia Brody in 1964, included filmed mother-child interaction, projective psychodiagnostic assessments, and psychoanalytically oriented interviews with parents and children. Drs. Massie and Szajnberg inherited the project for the 30-year followup in 1994, which they conducted from an attachment perspective. Findings highlight the relative importance of early attachment versus later childhood trauma for subsequent emotional health. Some participants lives demonstrate how trauma can remain hidden unconsciously and/or intentionally from interviewers until it emerges years later, which raises implications for treatment. Mother-infant films of 4 participants with a 60-year followup will be shown.

# FILM

### SCREENING AND DISCUSSION =

A House Made of Splinters (2022) directed by Simon Lereng Wilmont is an intimate and emotionally resonant documentary film about children living in a Ukrainian shelter just prior to the recent Russian invasion. Each child is scarred by trauma: the unbearable loss of their parents due to alcohol, physical punishment, poverty, previous wars, and neglect. From the newly arrived 6-year-old clutching her doll, to the 12-year-old big brother who can't bear being separated from his little sister, the film captures the joy and sorrow of these young lives as they form connections with one another. Thankfully, the film also profiles the most loving and supportive staff, as the filmmaker trains his camera on the shelter, observing the activities and the interventions, without any outside commentary from experts in the field. Ultimately the film tenderly shines a light on the impact of affectionate care, on the children's sense of self and of the future, despite the landscape of an extremely harsh reality. Join Reyna Cowan as we watch and read the film together.

## Freud in his Psychosocial Generation: Durkheim, Simmel, Weber and Du Bois

Nancy J. Chodorow, PhD is an American sociologist and professor. She began her career as a professor of Women's studies at Wellesley College in 1973, and from 1974 on taught at the University of California, Santa Cruz, until 1986. She then was a professor in the departments of sociology and clinical psychology at the University of California, Berkeley until she resigned in 1986, after which she taught psychiatry at Harvard Medical School/Cambridge Health Alliance. Chodorow is often described as a leader in feminist thought, especially in the realms of psychoanalysis and psychology.

Chodorow has written a number of influential books in contemporary feminist writing, including The Reproduction of Mothering: Psychoanalysis and the Sociology of Gender (1978); Feminism and Psychoanalytic Theory (1989); Femininities, Masculinities, Sexualities: Freud and Beyond (1994); and The Power of Feelings: Personal Meaning in Psychoanalysis, Gender, and Culture (1999). In 1996, The Reproduction of Mothering was chosen by Sociology as one of the top ten most influential books of the past 25 years.

He is in private practice in San Francisco.



Peter Goldberg, PhD, is a Personal and Supervising Analyst at the Psychoanalytic Institute of Northern California, is Chair of Faculty at the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis, and on the faculty of the Wright Institute in Berkeley.
