SFCP President's Report

Welcome to the start of 2024–25 at SFCP! As we launch the new academic year, it is astonishing to reflect on how far we have come post–pandemic in restoring a sense of SFCP as an embodied, vibrant community dedicated to psychoanalytic education and growth. Last year, we saw an enormous increase in volunteer participation and renewed program offerings, including the return of the Scientific Meetings, the Visiting Professor events, and the Day With Adam Phillips (courtesy of the Emmanuel Windholz Fund), alongside the continued thriving of existing programs. We look forward to building and strengthening this foundation in the upcoming year, with multiple new offerings planned for our members and the wider community.

Regarding our educational programs, it is also inspiring to see the renewed interest in psychoanalysis amongst both early career and established clinicians in our wider community - as evidenced by our full training programs in psychoanalysis, psychoanalytic psychotherapy, and the multiple offerings through the CCSW and Extension Divisions. As exposure to psychoanalysis has dwindled within clinical licensing programs and other mental health organizations across the country, SFCP has come to play an increasingly important role in keeping the field of psychoanalysis alive in the Bay Area and beyond. SFCP is now one of the largest and most active psychoanalytic institutions in the country by nearly all metrics, including number of members, variety of program offerings, and the vitality of our psychoanalytic training program, with twice as many candidates in seminars relative to several years ago, full classes enrolled for 2024-25, and the 2025-26 class already half-filled. This past year, graduates from the SFCP analytic training program constituted half of all graduating candidates from APsA-affiliated psychoanalytic training programs in the United States! Our psychoanalytic psychotherapy training programs, CCSW, and Extension Divisions offer multiple points of access for students of all backgrounds and levels of experience to explore and deepen their clinical work.

Much of the enduring appeal and resilience of psychoanalysis derives from its core commitment to exploring and expanding our understanding of ourselves, our collectives, and the ever-evolving ways we relate to each other within our intersecting communities. As a psychoanalytic Center, we have a responsibility within our own organization to embody this commitment to exploration and evolution. Many efforts toward this goal are now underway, including the work of the Strategic Directions teams focused on various aspects of our group life – how we welcome and support our existing members, how we resolve our conflicts, and how we develop and foster sustainable and responsive leadership. Our DEI Steering Committee led by organizational consultant David Luna has been reflecting on our systemic practices and offering important insights regarding the ways in which systemic racism and other built-in unconscious biases may be limiting the full creative and educational potential of both our organization and our field. Our Vision & Mission Writing Team is thoughtfully integrating the drafts and ideas generated in our all-members meeting (and pre-meeting survey) to craft a new SFCP Vision & Mission statement which articulates SFCP's commitment to the lifelong study, practice, and evolution of psychoanalysis. Drafts of the Vision & Mission statements will be ready for review and comment by the full SFCP membership this fall.

We are so grateful to each of our hard-working SFCP staff members and dedicated volunteer members for all of the ways in which you have stepped up to contribute to this process of renewal and growth. We look forward to continuing this work in the upcoming year!

Psychoanalytic Education Division Report

Dear SFCP Community-

Welcome Back!

It is hard to believe that September is already here and that we are starting a new academic year at SFCP!

On behalf of the PED, I want to welcome our new first year candidates: Kyle Bickel, Stephanie Chiao, Rebecca Hammond; Fei Hu; Kyle McMahan; Christopher Nemes & Shervin Dina Wang-Kraus. I also want to welcome back our continuing candidates!

We are beginning the year with the Psychoanalytic Training Program in a strong position, with approximately 35 candidates in seminars and an outstanding group of faculty teaching. This also promises to be an exciting year as classes for the incoming cohort in 2024–25 and beyond will be held almost entirely in-person for candidates, and instructors will also be encouraged to participate in person to the greatest extent possible.

I am also extremely pleased to announce our current roster of Chairs on the PED Committee: Chair: Beth Steinberg; Vice-Chair: Bill Glover; Dean: Leora Benioff; Secretary: Catherine Mallouh; Admissions Co-Chairs: Maureen Ruffell & Dena Sorbo; Child/Adolescent Analytic Program Co-Chair: Marsha Silverstein; Curriculum Committee: Maria Longuemare, Chair & Adam Goldyne, Associate Chair; Training & Supervising Analyst Committee: Holly Gordon; Advisor/Mentorship Committee: Suzanne Klein; Candidate Representatives: Megan Goodwin & Tua Mulligan; Committee on Psychoanalysis Across Disciplines (CPAD): Naomi Janowitz; & Outreach Committee: Adam Goldyne. In the last several months the PED announced several important policy and procedure changes, as well as some important new initiatives.

• Candidate Training Grants are now available for any candidate who self-identifies as a person of color and/or as having financial need. Applications are now being accepted (until September 15)!

• The PED's **New Post-Covid Requirements for Supervision**, **Control Cases and Personal Analysis** are now active as of September 2024. The new requirements emphasize respect for ongoing medical concerns while re-emphasizing the importance of in-person experience during analytic training where possible. Please see the <u>Candidate Handbook</u> for these new Policies and Procedures, as well as the new policies and procedure about requesting Exceptions.

Psychoanalytic Education Division Report cont.

- This past spring the PED initiated a **Survey about analysts' and candidates' experiences** with the **Progressions & Graduation Committee**, which **136** analyst and candidate members in total participated in. Stay tuned this fall for the PED to release the full results of this and a chance to give more feedback!
- This spring the PED also initiated a new process around **Candidate Feedback to Supervising Analysts**. See the <u>Candidate Handbook</u> for details.
- The PED also changed the **policies around first and second case permission**. Candidates may now begin cases as soon as they have a patient in 3-5x/week analysis and a supervisor for the case.
- We also announced a new <u>Candidate Course Evaluation Form</u> for instructors to fill out at course completion and a new policy the PGC requesting that if instructors have significant concerns or areas of development about a candidate that they may want to note in the end-of-course candidate feedback, that they first discuss the issue with the candidate while the course is still in progress so that there is an opportunity for the concern to be addressed.

SFCP Community Members - Mentoring Program!

Would you like to meet with an analyst to discuss your questions about psychoanalytic thinking and clinical work? We'd love to meet with you! The Mentoring Program at SFCP matches participants with analyst mentors to discuss the mentee's interest in psychoanalytic work.

The Mentoring Program is open to mental health clinicians at all levels of training and experience, who are SFCP Community Members, an easy and fun community to join! Mentors meet once a month with mentees for the academic year.

Examples of Topics to Discuss:

- Information, resources and literature to help a mentee explore particular areas of interest. For example: work with particular populations such as trauma survivors; current thinking about LGBTQ issues; the impact of race, class and culture on psychological life; child work; mindfulness; research about psychoanalytic process; and psychoanalytic interfaces with other fields such as poetry, literature, neurosciences
- How to choose among current activities, programs, courses, and services offered by SFCP that are relevant to the mentee's interests and stage of training
- Questions about developing as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and about psychoanalytic training
- Connecting the mentee with colleagues who the mentor thinks might be a valuable resource based on the mentee's interest in a particular subject

I feel very fortunate to meet with my mentor as needs arise."

Kyle Bickel, MD (he/him)

I am originally from Los Angeles, but made my way to Virginia for medical school and Sacramento for residency. I have been at UC Davis ever since and now serve as a psychiatry attending in the main adult outpatient clinic. I am closely involved in the psychoanalytic curriculum which includes supervision, seminars, case conferences, psychiatry movie night, and various electives such as bedside psychotherapy. My other main focus in the

However, things took a sharp turn for me after witnessing, up close, both the ravaging of psyche by life and its renewal through a meaningful psychotherapeutic dialogue and relationship. Looking to merge my early artistic and sociocultural experiences with my burgeoning interest in the mind, I changed tracks to study psychology, neuroscience, and East Asian languages and cultures, which is how I eventually ended up in psychiatry.

My interest in practicing psychoanalysis was completely solidified in my last year of residency when I started my training at SFPPTP. It was an incredibly nourishing and transformative experience for me to be mentored by my three supervisors and to be steeped in a community of similarly invested colleagues. I am looking forward to having that experience with everyone again.



Stephanie Chiao, MD (she/her)



Linna Duan, MD (she/her)






Ariel Schonfeld, MD (she/her)

Charles Bay, MD, MPH (he/him)



Eve Solomon, MD (she/her)


